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

PRIMARY FINDINGS SUMMARY


- The region is very diverse and has grown in diversity during the past decade. Most change has occurred outside of the urban core.
- Non-Hispanic White residents are most likely to live in a homogeneous Census tract, followed by Hispanics.
- Census tracts that are majority African American or Hispanic are most located in eastern Houston, the inner ring suburbs and, for Hispanics, in rural Census tracts.
- The dissimilarity index—a measure of segregation—shows moderate levels of segregation in Harris and Fort Bend Counties, and, to a lesser extent, in Brazoria, Galveston, Liberty, and Matagorda.
- Poverty concentrations occur in many racially and ethnically concentrated areas—mostly within and surrounding the urban core.
- Many Census tracts contain a range of households by income.
- Harris County provides a disproportionate share of subsidized housing given the county's share of the region's households.
- High performing schools are present throughout the region but job training sites are not correlated with areas of high employment.

Census Tracts That Increased In Diversity Between 2000 and 2010, Houston-Galveston Region




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Population Distribution by Census Tract Majority, 2010



Census Tracts Greater than 50% African American, Asian or Hispanic Residents; Houston-Galveston Region, 2010




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

Census Tract Composition by Income for the Typical Lower-, Middle- and Upper-Income Households, 2007-2011 ACS








Areas of High Unemployment, Houston-Galveston Region, 2010

 - Poverty and income integration
- Analyze opportunity indicators by Census tract for the region, transects, counties and a selection of FHEA communities


