






Population Growth Forecast

Harris County grew by 88% from 1980 to 2015 and is expected to reach 6,328,000 residents by 2040.




Residents Per Square Mile






Poverty Rate






Building Permits Issued

Single-family construction has not recovered from a peak in 2006 while multi-family permits have dropped sharply between 2014 and 2016.




Housing Tenure


Vacant Housing Units


Housing Type





Median Home Value




Housing Units Built Since 2000




Unemployment Rate


Earnings of Residents
















Residents in 100-year Floodplain

Residents in Hurricane Evacuation Zone




Mean Commute to Work (minutes)


Commute Mode to Work


Vehicle Miles Traveled per Person
